


In 2010 Regional Clubs will again have an opportunity to generate additional funds through the New Holland sponsorship. New Holland is donating a Rustler all-terrain utility vehicle for clubs to use as a raffle item. Regional Clubs will once again receive 50 percent of the proceeds from the sale of each ticket.

As we look ahead, we see another year of financial challenges. But these challenges make us work smarter and provide new definitions of what it means to grow. These are the times that teach us the most and prepare us best for the future. We continue to grow in wisdom, resourcefulness, creativity, perseverance, unity. 

Setting a new stage for the future

In 2009, the American Paint Horse Association (APHA) embraced the challenges presented by a troubled economy. Even though the Association has been impacted, the focus continues to be on the future and planning for better days to come.

The Registration Incentive was implemented in 2008 and continued to yield great results for APHA in 2009. So far this program has resulted in 5,654 total additional registrations and 3,070 transfers, with 1,591 of those registrations and 1,004 of those transfers in 2009 alone. With 981,400 horses registered so far, APHA is now approaching its one millionth horse registration and plans are underway to celebrate this exciting milestone.

Embracing technology and social media has been another progressive movement made by APHA in 2009 through adding Twitter accounts and Facebook pages. By following these often-updated accounts, members

can stay instantly informed about all the latest happenings throughout the Paint world.

Feature articles and cover stories about APHA and American Paint Horses appeared in many premier equine publications in 2009 including *Horse & Rider*, *Western Horseman*, *Horse Illustrated*, *Equine Journal*, *Quarter Horse News*, *Performance Horse*, *Western Shooting Horse*, *The Horse*, *Show Life*, *Barrel Racing News*, Fort Worth's *Key Magazine* and other publications around the world. The reach carried over to the online community as well with coverage not only by local Web sites, but also a feature on Paints in reining on *DressageDaily.com*, Association news coverage by *GoHorseShow.com*, *TheHorse.com*, *AmericanHorsePubs.org*, *EquestrianMag.com*, and too many others to name.

Reaching new heights and setting new records was the name of the game for Paint racing in 2009. Track records were broken, including two in one night during the trials of the Grade 1 Lone Star Park Paint and Appaloosa Futurity when Judys Rocket To Cash broke the track record previously held by Got Country Grip. Two races later, that record was broken by Cutrock. In the finals of that race, Cutrock bested his previous record. Top sire, Judys Lineage, set a new precedent when he reached the \$4 million mark in offspring earnings. This was accomplished in part by one of his offspring who won the Grade 1 Graham Paint and Appaloosa Futurity. The purse was the first in Paint racing history to top the \$200,000 marker. The winner, I Kick, brought

home \$104,120 for the win. Got Country Grip was again making his presence known, bringing home the first-ever fifth consecu-

tive World Champion title for Solid Paint-Bred racehorses.

The *Paint Horse Journal* welcomed a new editor, Jeannie Blancq Putney, of Lexington, Kentucky. She hit the ground running, creating a consistent look for all of APHA's publications and incorporating the youth magazine, *Generation J*, into the *Paint Horse Journal* as a featured section in each issue. Putney oversaw the renovation of the *Paint Horse Journal* Web site and incorporated a successful subscription drive into a special tribute to halter stallion Mighty Awesome who passed away in May. The loss of this top stallion was featured in the August issue, with tributes placed on the *Journal's* Web site.

Several APHA-registered horses were tops in national competition, garnering media interest and industry recognition. Three horses took top honors with the National Reined Cow Horse Association (NRCHA) during the NRCHA Fort Dodge Animal Health Celebration of Champions in San Angelo, Texas, in February. Cookin Merada, ridden by Todd Crawford, won the event beating the 70-horse field. Zezes Pepto Cat won the NRCHA Open Hackamore World Championship title ridden by Tom Neel. One Smokin Chic, with Bozo Rogers aboard, won the NRCHA Open Bridle division as well as the NRCHA Supreme Cow Horse award.

Preparations for the 2010 Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games included a Reining Test Event in July at the Kentucky Horse Park, the venue where the Games will be held. Darlins Not Painted was piloted by Tom McCutcheon to win the FEI World Equestrian Games Kentucky Cup Reining individual final against other top horses and riders from around the world.

In November, a young Paint stallion named Gunnatrashya won the NRHA Open Futurity in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Top NRHA rider, Shawn Florida,

rode the 3-year-old to victory earning \$125,000 in prize money. This was only the second time an American Paint Horse has won this milestone event.

In 2009, the World Championship Show became a two-part series with the Youth events comprising the majority of the Summer Show and the Open and Amateur events making up the majority of the Fall Show. Reining and cattle classes remained at the summer event. Both shows contained different Challenge and Sweepstakes classes while the Slot and much-anticipated Breeders' Futurity classes took place at the fall event.

The Summer World Show brought in 690 horses and 1,870 entries. A total of 94 World Championship trophy buckles were awarded this year to individuals claiming the coveted World titles in the summer. Sixty-six classes were held to feature the 1,256 Youth entries in the show. "Paint For A Day" also came to town for the first time during the summer show, with 38 entries. This event was designed to give local youth a taste of what it is like to own and show an American Paint Horse and to introduce them to AjPHA members at the show.

The Fall World Show brought in 847 horses and 1,945 entries competing in Open, Amateur, Novice Amateur, Solid Paint-Bred, Challenge, Sweepstakes, Slot and Breeders' Futurity classes. World Championship titles were awarded to 127 competitors along with large payouts drawn for the Slot and Breeders' Futurity classes. Also announced this year was the creation of additional Breeders' Futurity classes

for barrel horses and cutting horses, beginning in 2014. Slot class participants divided \$186,250. Breeders' Futurity payouts of over \$69,000 were distributed. Corporate sponsor Hart Trailers awarded a Hart "Medallion" model trailer valued at \$32,000 to the winner of the new Hart Non-Pro Versatility Challenge. Several free clinics from top horsemen and women were available to show exhibitors as well as local horse show enthusiasts, compliments of corporate sponsor Purina Mills.

Officially, the two shows included more than 3,800 entries in 266 classes. Entries came from approximately 40 U.S. states and Canadian

provinces, as well as from Mexico, Czech Republic, Venezuela and Australia. A total of \$379,162 was paid out at both shows.


This year's AjPHA Youth President, Banks Ready, set the bar high for future presidents through his project with Make-A-Wish titled Painted Dreams. His project was the most successful presidential project to date in Association history, raising \$100,000 to grant 19 wishes to benefit the Make-A-Wish Foundation. Incoming AjPHA Youth President Brandyl Brooks chose to help wounded veterans with her project, Painted Warriors. Her project is ongoing.

Two notable awards were given in 2009 including the Lifetime Achievement Award to Pat Mullins and the Distinguished Service Award to Duke Neff. Mullins was honored for his work with APHA, AjPHA and the American Paint Horse Foundation as well as his work in therapeutic riding and equine insurance education. APHA judge Duke Neff was given the Distinguished Service Award for his contributions to the ongoing promotion and development of the American Paint Horse breed and Association as well as his contributions to the clubs and youth over the many years he has judged and mentored.

The American Paint Horse Association has a long history of overcoming obstacles and staying positive about the future. While the economy is still recovering, the stage has been set for success

and more changes are to come to keep this proud breed represented well now and in the future. ■

Distinguished Service Award

Duke Neff receives American Paint Horse Association's highest honor



Missouri resident and longtime Paint Horse proponent Duke Neff was honored with the 2009 Distinguished Service Award, the American Paint Horse Association's highest member honor.

One of the earliest proponents of the American Paint Horse breed, Duke Neff of Pleasant Hill, Missouri, was honored with the highest award given by the American Paint Horse Association. During the 2009 APHA Fall World Championship Show, Neff received the honor, a fitting tribute to someone who has been a champion for the Paint Horse both inside and outside the show ring.

The Distinguished Service Award is given annually to a special APHA member who has helped the Association make significant strides through the years. Neff was recognized in 2009 for more than 40 years of exemplary service to APHA and his efforts to advance the Association and improve the breed both locally and nationally.

During those 40 years of service, Neff has been a leader in promotion of the Paint Horse breed. Neff was involved in the establishment of the breed magazines the Association still publishes today and helped create a video, entitled "No Two Alike," that was a popular promotional piece. In addition, Neff's own Paint Horse, Prairie Doll, was the first Paint Horse to carry the Kansas City Chiefs flag down the football field at games—a tradition that has been re-established by the Chiefs. That same horse accompanied the Chiefs to the very first 1967 Super Bowl, according to Neff.

Neff was also involved in the establishment of the infrastructure of the American Paint Horse Association and its show programs. He served on many committees and was a National Director from 1968-1982 as well as a member of the APHA Executive Committee in 1973. In show ring program development, he helped form the qualification rules of the APHA Regional Clubs and the multi-judge Paint-O-Rama concept used at shows. Neff is a qualified APHA judge and will judge his 200th show this year. He was instrumental in organizing and establishing many APHA Paint Horse clubs throughout the nation.

In addition to having an eye for the winner in the show ring, he also bred and raised quality Paint Horses. Nine of those horses went on to become APHA Champion award winners. ■




Cumulative total horses registered

Total horses registered in 2009







Total horses registered by bloodline




Total horses registered by pattern







Incentive Programs

Breeders' Trust records another successful year

For the seventh consecutive year, APHA's Breeders' Trust program paid out more than \$1 million for Paint Horses with performance records. In 2009, the incentive program for Paint Horse owners, exhibitors, racers and breeders boasted a total of \$1,140,086.72.

Breeders' Trust funds are based on a point system, with each point being worth a specific amount of money. The 2009 value was \$15.03 per point. Yearly dividends are paid to subscribed stallion owners, foal nominators and recorded owners of horses enrolled in the program. The stallion subscriber receives 20 percent of the dividend, the foal nominator 10 percent and the foal's recorded owner on December 31 of the showing year receives 70 percent.

It's difficult enough to get to the top of the Breeders' Trust list with one horse in any one year. But in 2009, the Ross family of Grayslake, Illinois, managed to capture the top two spots for the second consecutive year.

Jamie Ross rode Shes Alotta Splash to the top spot on the Breeders' Trust money earned list with 1,409 points; 1,216 of those in Amateur competition and 193 in Open company for a total of \$21,178.96. Right behind her came her twin sister, Jennifer, on Bodacious Enterprise, who earned 1,301 points (1,062 Amateur and 239 Open).

And just when it seemed Zippos Sensation could not smash any more records, he managed to surpass himself. The surprise wasn't that he earned the American Paint Horse Association's Number 1 Breeders' Trust Stallion award for a record ninth time, but that he could continue to beat his own numbers. Zippo has 490 foals nominated to the Breeders' Trust. In 2009, 126 of those foals earned 147 more points than 2008, for a total of 6,932 points and a payout of \$104,195.68.

Perhaps it's the sheer versatility of the 1993 sorrel overo stallion's offspring. They can shine as youngsters in futurities and continue as veteran show horses. Brightly Zippo, a 1996 foal from Zippos Sensation's first crop, illustrates the amazing durability of these horses. In 2009, the gelding was still ranking in the Top 10 in Youth classes at the Summer World Show. ■



Breeders' Futurity celebrates first year

The inaugural Breeders' Futurity program, held in conjunction with the 2009 Fall World Championship Show, was a tremendous success. This prestigious competition featured the finest American Paint Horses and exhibitors in the world competing in a select slate of classes designed to showcase the offspring of Breeders' Trust-enrolled stallions and mares bred to those stallions. In 2009, the program had 64 entries vying for a total of \$69,052.50 in purse money and awards. ■

Paint Racing records were smashed in 2009

Paint racing experienced some surprising and exciting moments in 2009, with record-breaking race purses, race results and stallion earnings. The racing program saw 540 Paint Horses start in 535 APHA-recognized races across 17 states, competing for more than \$4.7 million in purse money.

Continuing his domination of the Paint racing scene, Got Country Grip showed he still has what it takes as an older horse on the track, winning his 20th race and being named World Champion Solid Paint-Bred for a record fifth year. A talented 3-year-old gelding, PF Chief Runnin Bear, was named World Champion Regular Registry after a stellar performance in the top derbies of the year, including the Graham Derby and Speedhorse Derby.

2009 was a year to break many records, with Chicks Lacerta breaking the track record in the Dash For Colors Stakes at Will Rogers Downs with a time of :15.60 seconds on April 4. In May, the running of the Grade 1 Graham Paint and Appaloosa Futurity at Remington Park featured the largest purse in the history of Paint racing at over \$200,000. I Kick earned \$104,120 for the win. The win by I Kick also set into motion another record

for her sire, Judys Lineage. Judys Lineage had already made headlines for topping \$3 million in offspring earnings, but when I Kick crossed the finish line first in the Graham, it kicked his offspring earnings into a whole new category of over \$4 million—the first and only Paint sire to accomplish this milestone.

An exciting night of firsts would also occur in November at the trials for the Grade 1 Lone Star Park Paint and Appaloosa Futurity, when two track records were made. The first trial was won by Judys Rocket To Cash, running a :17.59 and beating the previous track record held by Got Country Grip. However, in the third trial of the night, Cutrock beat Judys Rocket To Cash's time by running the 350-yard length in :17.53. In the finals, Cutrock beat his own record by winning the finals to the futurity in a time of :17.31 seconds.

The “face” of the Paint racing program was also updated through the redesign of the Paint racing Web site, as well as a fresh name and logo for the *Paint Horse Racing* magazine. For information on the racing program, visit paintracing.com ■







Our values and operating principles are unwavering:



The year 2009 proved to be a good one for us. It was a good year, not only because our grants, including scholarship payouts, were at an all-time high, but also because we conducted ambitious outreach activities that helped us make new friends and expanded our donor base.

Trail riding organizations, a sheriff posse, several APHA regional clubs, businesses, an equine news Web site and many others interested in our initiatives joined with us this year. Among our many charitable activities, we granted several therapeutic riding grants (a first), boosted our scholarship payout and conducted a number of other charitable activities.

And the bottom line is that when all grants, scholarships and expenses are factored in, our financial statement contains a sizable increase over the previous year. I am sure you would agree that in this economy, this is a significant accomplishment.

The success of our American Paint Horse Foundation can be attributed to you, the people who support our programs. If you joined us on a trail ride, a dinner, an auction, Kids Day activity or some other function, I hope you had a good time. And most of all, I hope you became a believer that we can improve our world through interaction with American Paint Horses.

We use the “Power of Paints” to improve our world. The Foundation also preserves the heritage of the American Paint Horse and ensures it remains a healthy, vibrant and respected part of our culture.

The American Paint Horse Foundation

- Fosters positive youth development.
- Promotes healthy lifestyles.
- Improves lives and communities through interaction with Paint Horses.
- Instills pride in the heritage of the American Paint Horse and our Association.
- Funds research that ensures the health and vitality of the American Paint Horse.

The Foundation is a recognized IRS 501(c)(3) charitable organization.

The Trail Ahead

We are currently:

- Strengthening our existing college scholarship and youth leadership programs;
- Establishing new funds to support therapeutic riding students and stables;
- Creating equine educational materials for school children, 4-H groups and others;
- Developing initiatives involving Paint Horses that support healthy lifestyles, teach responsibility, help teachers connect with students, and educate youngsters about the magnificent history of the horse;
- Identifying equine research projects;
- Developing new funding opportunities to support our mission.

Accomplishments

- The American Paint Horse Foundation saw an increase of \$98,063 in total net assets on its books for 2009 compared to the previous year.
- The Foundation issued \$45,000 in youth scholarships in 2009, up more than \$3,000 from the previous year.
- Eleven grants, totaling \$5,500 were issued to therapeutic riding centers. The APHF also awarded \$4,273 to St. Jude Children’s Research Hospital.
- The Therapeutic Riding Fund now stands at nearly \$41,417 and growing.
- Zone 7 donated half the proceeds of a show to a Foundation scholarship fund in late Paint Horse trainer Jim Pacelli’s name. The result—show numbers hit a record level and a total of \$3,750 was raised for the AjPHA Youth Scholarship Fund.
- APHF launched a “Give a Kid a Leg Up on Life” boot drive in 2009 and supplied more than 150 pairs of safe footwear for the children riding horses at Camp Carter YMCA in Fort Worth, Texas.
- Ninety-eight trainers had signed on to help the Foundation’s Find a Trainer program and 27 people contracted for their services, earning \$16,890 for the scholarship program.
- GoHorseShow.com conducted a “Trainer Bowl” which resulted in \$12,826 raised for the Lynn Simons Scholarship Fund.

Paint Horse Foundation successful in mission to improve lives, raise funds, build awareness

The American Paint Horse Foundation made significant progress in 2009 by expanding its donor base, building awareness of its activities, and improving lives through interaction with horses. It was an action-packed year that included:

Bat Masterson Poker Ride and Casino Night

Activities for 2009 started May 2 with APHF's "Bat Masterson Poker Ride and Casino Night" to benefit St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and the Foundation's therapeutic riding program.

The Foundation events were co-hosted by APHA, Benbrook Stables, in Benbrook, Texas, the Texas Equestrian Trail Riders Association, and the Tarrant County Sheriff Posse.

A total of \$8,766 was netted at the event, with \$4,373 donated to St. Jude's and \$4,393 to the Foundation's Therapeutic Riding program. APHA employees and their families raised more than \$4,800 through their participation and support.

Kids learn about horses at Paint Horse Kids Day

Children who always wanted to ride a horse had the chance on May 16, when the American Paint Horse Foundation hosted its annual "Paint Horse Kids Day" at the YMCA Camp Carter Equestrian Center in Fort Worth. Despite a downpour of rain, kids and their parents turned out to ride, rope, play games, listen to the Cowtown Opry Buckaroo youth singers and enjoy lunch under the YMCA's big covered arena.

Funds at Work

More youth riding took place six weeks later, when supporters of the spring 2009 Bat Masterson Poker Ride and Casino Night were able to see their donations at work at the Summer World Championship Paint Horse Show in Fort Worth on July 2 and 3. On those dates, the American Paint Horse Foundation hosted a successful therapeutic riding event.

Through proceeds from the May event, the Foundation was able to award seven \$500 grants to therapeutic riding centers that participated in the event. Funding was also used to award colorful Paint Horse trophies to 32 riders.

History-making event for Paint Horse Foundation

The Foundation's therapeutic riding show, which was named "The Freedom Challenge," in keeping with a patriotic salute around the July 4th holiday, was a history-making event for the organization. It marked the first-ever therapeutic riding event at APHA World Show.

Many of the equines participating were retired show horses. They proved their value by serving a higher calling—to help children rehabilitate through the healing power of horses.

The Foundation raised \$7,475 during the Summer APHA World Show. This included \$5,750 from proceeds from warm-up class activities, in which participants donated to the Foundation in exchange for morning arena practice times, and an additional \$1,725 netted from a silent auction.

APHA members continue to show support

APHA members continued to show their support for the Foundation in many generous ways, including a special benefit dinner held in conjunction with the Association's annual Workshop in Irving, Texas. The Foundation netted \$8,345 through dinner ticket sales, a silent auction and a live auction hosted by APHA Past President Tom Elliott of Benson, Arizona.

A high point for awareness

The American Paint Horse Foundation traveled to Colorado later in the year and joined with more than 100 APHA directors, the U.S. Air Force Academy and Bell Mountain Stables in Castle Rock, Colorado, to raise awareness and support for its work to improve lives through interaction with Paint Horses.

The Foundation kicked off its activities on October 1, at Bell Mountain Stables with its "Vaquero Gran Gala." The event included

therapeutic riding demonstrations, dinner, a lively Mariachi band, as well as live and silent auctions. Participants in the therapeutic riding events included riders and horses from Praying Hands Ranches of Parker, Colorado, and The Urban Farm in Denver, Colorado.

Special guests at the Gran Gala included U.S. Air Force Equestrian Center Director Billy Jack Barrett and his wife, Anne; Lieutenant Colonel Mike Springer and wife, Jeanne, who heads up the Academy Warrior Wellness and Wounded Warrior Programs; Colonel Ken Roth and wife, Susan; and Command Sergeant Major Patrick Valdez and his wife, Donna.

The Foundation issued \$1,500 in grants to therapeutic riding centers participating in the event, including \$500 to the U.S. Air Force Academy for its Warrior Wellness Program, \$500 to Praying Hands Ranches and \$500 to The Urban Farm to continue their outstanding work.

The moving demonstrations and testimonials set the stage for a live auction conducted by former APHA President Tom Elliott, of Benson, Ariz.

APHA and Foundation “aim high” with Air Force Academy

Two days later, on October 3, APHA and the American Paint Horse Foundation were the honored guests of the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs. More than 80 riders traversed the scenic Rocky Mountain trails of the Academy. Riders witnessed the vibrant colors of the changing Aspen leaves and wildlife along the way, including curious does and fawns.

The event was billed by the Foundation as the “American Paint Horse Freedom Ride” to support the troops who defend our everyday freedoms. Riders turned out with patriotic attire to show their support of our fighting men and women.

After every touchdown and successful field goal kick, Kansas City Chiefs Cheerleader and APHA member Susie Derouchey and Warpaint make a celebratory run down the middle of Arrowhead Stadium, to the roaring approval of 70,000 fans.

More than 80 riders, consisting of APHA directors, and horse enthusiasts in the Colorado Springs and Denver area mounted up last fall for the “Paint Horse Freedom Ride” in support of our troops. The American Paint Horse Foundation also hosted a “Vaquero Gran Gala” to benefit therapeutic riding and youth scholarships. More than 200 people attended.

In all, \$5,336 was netted by the Foundation after expenses for the Gran Gala festivities and trail ride.

Foundation continues mission at APHA Fall Show

The Foundation continued its progress to build awareness and funding during the APHA Fall World Show in Fort Worth, netting \$13,766 in silent auctions and warm-up classes, and an additional \$1,867 netted in filly ticket sales, for a total net sum of \$15,633.

Since the APHA Fall World Show spanned Veteran’s Day, the Foundation dedicated commemorative T-shirts and two special silent auction items to support horseback riding therapy programs for our nation’s fighting men and women.

Country music legend Charlie Daniels donated an autographed, golden fiddle to the Foundation earlier this year. The Foundation, in turn, put the fiddle up for bid during the APHA Fall World Show. The winning bid of \$3,000 was made by Mary and Robert Parrott of Ruston, Louisiana.

Clay Gant of Cowboy Bronze in Cross Timbers, Missouri, donated a beautiful bronze sculpture to the cause as well, and his creation earned \$850 from high bidder Tommy Ford of Ford Farms in Whitesboro, Texas. The commemorative T-shirt sales brought in an additional \$4,300, spearheaded by an aggressive sales drive by Judy Ford, a member of the APHF Board of Directors. The Foundation awarded a special \$500 check to Rocky Top Ranch to continue its work for veterans.

The Foundation also said farewell to its prized “Foundation Filly,” Heavenly Cat. Raffle winner Glenn Schoen of Kaufman, Texas, received a well-trained, beautiful Paint filly with impeccable bloodlines.

Foundation’s NFL dream team

To end the year, the Foundation recognized the NFL’s Kansas City Chiefs and a colorful horse-and-rider team for preserving the heritage of the American Paint Horse and once again including our breed in game celebrations.

Chiefs Warpaint and Kansas City Chiefs cheerleader Susie Derouchey received the Foundation’s “Legendary Achievement Award” on Dec. 20, at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City, Kansas, before the start of Chiefs final home game of the 2009 season.

To the thundering applause of about 70,000 Kansas City fans at each home game, Derouchey and “Warpaint” sprinted down the middle of Arrowhead Stadium after every Chiefs touchdown and successful field goal kick. In all, more than 540,000 people at the stadium witnessed their celebratory rides last football season.

The appearances held special significance for APHA, considering Warpaint is a registered American Paint Horse and Derouchey is an active APHA member who has a long history of owning and showing Paints.

When factoring in all activity expenses, operating costs, and grants, the American Paint Horse Foundation saw an increase of more than \$98,000 in total net assets on its books for 2009 compared to 2008. ■



*Filly fundraiser was discontinued at national level for legal reasons. Figure is total ticket sales.



Scholarship Award History




Major Fundraisers Summary*

Foundation Total Net Assets





Notes to Financial Statements

For the Years Ended December 31, 2009 and 2008

1. Organization and summary of significant accounting policies

Organization

The American Paint Horse Association, Inc. (The Association) is a not-for-profit membership organization incorporated under the laws of Texas and exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(5) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. The Association was formed in 1962 to collect, record, and preserve the pedigree of Paint Horses. In addition, the Association is responsible for promoting and disseminating knowledge and information related to the Paint Horse breed.

Basis of Accounting and Revenue Recognition

The accounts are maintained and the financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Membership dues and subscription fee revenues are recognized over the applicable membership or subscription period. All other revenue is recognized in the period in which the services are provided. Breeders' Trust support and Breeders' Futurity support is recognized as temporarily restricted net assets and will be released from restrictions in the applicable distribution years. (See Note 3. Restricted Programs, Breeders' Trust and Breeders' Futurity Programs.)

Cash

For purposes of these financial statements, the Association considers cash to be all cash on hand, cash in banks in demand accounts, cash in investment brokerage money market accounts, as well as amounts deposited in U.S. Treasury backed money market accounts. Cash, restricted, is cash deposited specifically for the Breeders' Trust and Breeders' Futurity programs.

Investments

The Association carries investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities at their fair values in the statement of financial position. The Association has investments in Structured Investments (See Note 4. Investments, Unrestricted) with embedded derivatives, which are financial instruments whose performance is linked to that of an underlying asset or assets. The Structured Investments are bonds with various embedded market indices used to hedge against interest rate fluctuations. The Association's investment policy allows for the use of derivatives for this purpose. Unrealized gains and losses of all investments are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

Inventory

APHA General Store Collection and Promotional inventory is carried at the lower cost or market determined by first-in, first-out method. Annual merchandise write-downs to market of all items determined to be slow-moving or obsolete are reflected on the statements of activities under Program Services, General store. Write-downs for the years ending December 31, 2009 and 2008 were \$38,393 and \$58,577 respectively.

Property, Equipment, Depreciation and Collections

Property and equipment is stated at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, which range from 3-30 years.

The Association possesses various prints, original paintings and bronze sculptures purchased and carried at their cost or received as unrestricted gifts and carried at their estimated fair value. These works of art are on display and were not purchased or received for the purpose of re-sale. (See Note 7, Property And Equipment, Collectibles)

Federal Income Tax

The Association is an exempt organization under Section 501(c)(5) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. Income earned from the performance of its Internal Revenue Service exempt purpose is not subject to federal income tax. Income in excess of \$1,000 earned from its non-exempt purpose, (unrelated business income), would be taxable at normal U.S. corporate tax rates. The Association earned no taxable income from unrelated business activities for the years ending December 31, 2009 and 2008.

Basis of Presentation

The Association is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted net assets. The Association has no permanently restricted net assets.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Association to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash in reputable financial institutions located in Fort Worth, Texas. Occasionally, its cash deposits are in excess of the \$250,000, the maximum amount of coverage provided by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Congress has increased the FDIC deposit insurance from \$100,000 to \$250,000 per depositor through December 31, 2013.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. Restricted Programs

Breeders' Trust and Breeders' Futurity Programs

The Association provides added incentives for Paint Horse owners who exhibit their horses. The Breeders' Trust, established in 1994, to pay cash awards for points earned at Association approved events by nominated horses. The Breeders' Futurity, established in 2009, will pay cash awards for placings earned at Association-approved events by nominated horses. The Breeders' Trust and the Breeders' Futurity are accounted for as restricted programs and as such are reported in the Association's financial statements as temporarily restricted net assets due to the nature of the programs. Breeders' Trust and Breeders' Futurity (first year) award payouts for 2009 were \$1,167,064. Breeders' Trust award payouts for 2008 were \$1,176,425. (See Note 5. Investments, Restricted Breeders' Trust and Breeders' Futurity)

9. Employee Benefit Plans

401(k) Plan

The Association participates in a defined contribution plan under section 401(k). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) and qualifies for its deferral arrangement under U.S. Internal Revenue Code 401(k). The Plan covers all employees with one year of service over the age of 21 that work at least 1,000 hours within the previous year. The Plan has a noncontributory portion with a 5% contribution rate of eligible employees' wages. The Association may

match any eligible participants' contributory deferral to a maximum of 5% of their pre-tax compensation. Total expenses for the years ended December 31, 2009 and 2008 were \$12,785 and \$179,589, respectively.

Deferred Compensation Agreement

The Association has entered into an eligible non-qualified deferred compensation agreement that covers the Executive Director under U.S. Internal Revenue Code 457(b). This is a noncontributory plan with annual deferral amounts set by the U.S. Internal Revenue Code.

10. Commitments

Operating Leases

The Association leases certain pieces of office equipment and storage space under non-cancelable operating leases that expire at various dates through December 2014. For the year ended December 31, 2009, the leases required monthly payments of approximately \$9,619. Rental expense for those leases was approximately \$115,428 for the year ended December 31, 2009. In 2009, a lease agreement was entered into for equipment requiring payment of \$3,175 per month and a term of five years starting April 1, 2009. 11. Related Parties

It is chartered as a non-profit corporation in the state of Texas and is exempt under U.S. Internal Revenue Service Revenue Code 501(c)(3) as a charitable publicly supported organization under 509(a)(1). The Association contributes to the Foundation the accounting, managerial and administrative services necessary for the ordinary day-to-day operations. During 2009 and 2008, the amount of like-kind contributions to the Foundation in expenses and services rendered amounted to \$12,000 and \$12,000, respectively. In addition, the Association made unrestricted contributions in 2009 and 2008 of \$52,817 and \$36,795, respectively.



Notes to Financial Statements

For the Years Ended December 31, 2009 and 2008

1. Organization and summary of significant accounting policies

Organization

The American Paint Horse Foundation (Foundation) is organized for the purpose to reward and educate young horsemen and women and to preserve the history of the breed's accomplishments and artifacts associated with the outstanding bloodlines of the breed and individuals and institutions who contributed to these accomplishments. The Foundation resulted from a merger in 2005 between the American Paint Horse Heritage Foundation and the American Paint Horse Association Youth Development Foundation. It is chartered as a non-profit corporation in the state of Texas and is exempt under U.S. Internal Revenue Service Revenue Code 501(c)(3) as a charitable publicly supported organization under 509(a)(1).

Basis of Presentation

The Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets; temporarily restricted net assets; and permanently restricted net assets. Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

Cash

For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Foundation considers cash to be amounts in demand accounts and money market accounts.

Investments

The Foundation carries its investments in debt securities and common stock equities at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in net assets in the accompanying statement of activities.

Federal Income Tax

The Foundation is an exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. Revenue earned from its Internal Revenue Service exempt purposes is not subject to federal income tax. The Foundation qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(1). In 2009 and 2008, the Foundation had no unrelated earnings over the statutory \$1,000 exclusion.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash in reputable financial institutions located in Fort Worth, Texas.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Investments

The Foundation has investments in common stock equities through professionally managed funds. The investments held by the Foundation on December 31, 2009:

4. Restrictions on net assets

Permanently restricted net assets are to provide a permanent endowment, with investment income restricted for scholarship purposes. At December 31, 2009 and 2008, the permanently restricted net assets balance was \$732,258 and \$655,676 respectively.

5. Related Party

A portion of the Foundation's day-to-day functions are conducted by employees of the American Paint Horse Association (Association). The Association is a separate corporation (not-for-profit) organized for the purpose of collecting, recording and preserving the pedigree of the Paint Horse. The Foundation is managed by a board of directors which consists of members of the Association. These services and expenses are listed as an unrestricted support contribution and then as corresponding expenses per the criteria for recognition under generally accepted accounting principles. At December 31, 2009 and 2008, the amount was \$12,000 and \$12,000, respectively. In addition, the Association made unrestricted contributions in 2009 and 2008 of \$52,817 and \$36,975, respectively.
