As Agreements Officer (AO), leads the implementation of \$80-140 million annually for 11 HPF grant programs, including creation and revision of management policies in accordance with Office of Management and Budget (OMB) circulars, Department of Interior (DOI), and NPS regulations, and guidance created by the STLPG division. Lead the selection, review and evaluation of all HPF appropriations; prepare apportionments and navigate required review processes; and supervise the execution of over 300 competitive grant agreements annually. Also supervise the management, monitoring, closeout, and sometimes cancellation of grants annually for: 59 States and Territories, 200 Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, and funding made available to 2040 Certified Local Governments. Total responsibility equals 1000 active financial assistance grants per year totaling over \$350 million in Federal funding.

Directly supervise 14 staff, permanent, term, and contracted, that make up the STLPG Division. Use Team Leads to create a productive work environment under busy conditions due to increased number and funding of HPF grant programs. Management shifted to virtual setting during COVID, production increased, and new staff brought on and integrated into the virtual team. Review work accomplished by staff, then electronically release all awards, closeouts, cancellations, extensions, and modifications for over 1000 active grants. Complete performance plans for staff, conduct mid-year and final reviews on time, and reward through Performance and Star awards when work goes above expectations. Support, approve, and provide training and travel for staff as corresponds to mission and improves work capacity.

Manage administrative resources of \$5.7 million, across 7 funding lines, allocated to support the STLPG division. Allocate funding for permanent and term employees, and supplement through contracts for

Conduct Disaster grant training for States and Tribes, and Disaster Grant Listening Sessions to improve existing policies (which OEPC joined).
